Aside from propaganda views of controversial topics, simple facts are just wrong. Two examples are the campaign in Guadalcanal starting in November 1942, and that the conquest of Iwo Jima enabled the US Army to get B-29s within range of the Japanese home islands. Not only could they have left this useless crap off the program, and therefore included more broadcasts during the war, but at least check the accuracy of the crap. There are some interesting clips, but very few.
